Henryville, Indiana A Brief History & Walking Tour

Clark County, Indiana Territory was formed 3 February 1801.
Indiana became a State on 11 December 1816.
Collins Township formed ~1816 & renamed Monroe Township ~1826.
Morristown was plated in 1850 and renamed Henryville in 1853.

Before Henryville

Zebulon Collins operated a still house 1.5 miles east of Henryville at Silver Creek on Charlestown-Brownstown Road (now SE of CR160 and Caney Rd) around 1813. It lasted until about 1826. He then had a way tavern there. The first government polls for the township were opened in this tavern. From History of the Ohio Falls Cities and Their Counties 1889: "The old Collins fort, where the rangers were stationed, was situated about one and a half miles southeast of Henryville, on the Silver creek branch of Silver creek."

The Beginnings of Henryville

James R. Ferguson, son of Col. Henry Ferguson, owned the land that became Henryville. About 1848 he sold and donated land to the Jeffersonville & Indianapolis Railroad (later renamed Pennsylvania Railroad 1873) so that they would build the railroad through the area. In 1850, Joseph Biggs plated Morristown around the railroad. Morristown was renamed Henryville in honor of Col. Henry Ferguson in 1853 due to another town in Indiana with the same name.



Roads

Roads formed from Indian trails and along creeks. Several primary travel routes intersected around what was to become Henryville. A block house was located at the corner of Caney Road and CR160. It was also used as a stage coach stop. The Jeffersonville, Madison & Indianapolis Railroad, which brought on the development of Henryville, mostly follows an Indian trail.



Charlestown-Brownstown Road ran north-south. This road is now Brownstown Road and County Road 160. The east-west road was Salem-Charlestown Road which followed what is now Prall Hill Road to Pennsylvania Street to Main Street to Mt Zion Road



to the intersection of Henryville-Bluelick Road and Shelter Road and then followed CR160 west. Wall Street is now the section of CR160 in town. Old Main Street is now Penn Street. Old Salem Avenue is now Main Street. Highway 31 (Ferguson St) came from what was the track of the interurban electric train owned by Indianapolis & Louisville Traction Company. Built in 1904-1905, the interurban operated from 1905-1933 and ran from Louisville to Seymour. The tracks were removed in 1935. Interstate 65 with Exit 19 opened 14 September 1960.
